On Solid Rock

There are ROCKS and there are ROCKS

Many of them do not withstand the test of time.

Some crack and break apart before they start to crumble, until pebbles they become.

It takes a solid rock to stand

IMMOVABLE

Never to be undermined by quicksand.

Never to be upset when underground soil refuses to stick together.

Never to be threatened by natural disasters or by any kind of weather floods...windstorms...landslides...avalanches...hurricanes...

tornados...cyclones...typhoons...tsunamis...and more.

Even the strongest earthquake cannot make its foundation shake.

It's not the pull of gravity that anchors the solid rock or molds it tenaciously to the earth.

It's a special rock like no other found on any geological search.

The solid rock is a mighty rock, a dynamic force with a voice that called out several generations ago, "build my church, build my church."

That church was and is cUc—little c, big U, little c—

It answers to the name

University Christian Church (Disciples of Christ)

The forefathers and foremothers of cUc heard that voice saying "build my church."

They not only listened, they discerned the message and accepted the call.

They took on a bold new challenge,

yet they began to build with a clarity of purpose and with passion and compassion. They subscribed to the view that it takes a solid rock to be the bedrock of a church. They knew that the blueprints they drew were not only for building a structure of stone and brick and wood but also for building supportive ministries.

The founders grasped the opportunity to form a new faith community. They were

Visionaries who had the foresight and insight to see the future of what was to be;

Missionaries who went forth to share the Good News in word and in deed;

Truth, the touchstone for all things big and small; Morality & Justice, inclusiveness to welcome all;
Trust, in the promises and actions of others; Hope, erasing despair in the lives of sisters and brothers;
Wisdom, for making choices and decisions; Prayer, to empower people for divine-inspired visions;
Energy, expending it joyfully not wearily to complain; Courage, to face challenges, never the same;
Endurance, strength and perseverance—the mantra, "never quit." Encouragement, for more excitement;
Optimism, to see a job as well done before it begins; Love, to nourish mind, body, spirit before a day ends;
Faith, carrying the believers through, as they always knew it would!

Where are the untapped resources who will hear the voice calling, "build my church?"

Who will add the next stones and bricks and wood?

Who will be the mortar, nails, and other necessities for building sustaining ministries?

Who will take the next step in an unfolding plan to confer grace upon as many people as cUc can?"

New builders may say, "this is a new day. Change there will be and it's on the way."

If so, the continuing goal of cUc to achieve greatness in the past
